Anderson Park's New Picnic Shelter

A rustic log picnic shelter at Anderson Park is nearly complete and will be available for use after the park's September 25^{th} Grand Opening.



The large structure can easily accommodate 50 or more visitors. It sits in the midst of one of the park's seven areas of prairie, overlooking Horse Leg Lake. Three rain gardens planted with locally grown native flowers and grasses surround the building and a log kiosk in front of the shelter will welcome visitors with information about the park and the Anderson family.

The picnic shelter project drew donations and volunteers from the community. Many thanks go to Rob Jutz who provided his construction expertise and worked closely with Barry Wendorf on the shelter's design. Rob assisted Barry throughout the planning and construction phases.

The Little Alaska Cabin Company, a North Branch family business owned by Sam and Christina Hooper, was awarded the Isanti County contract for the hand-peeled, locally cut, white pine logs. They volunteered time and equipment to construct the framework.

Hognose snakes: the great pretenders

Did you know??? When frightened, a hognose snake will coil and flatten its head and neck two to three times its normal width. Hissing loudly, it will strike repeatedly, looking just like a cobra. If the feared predator does not retreat, the hognose snake will then roll over on its back and "play" dead!



Hognose snakes live on sandy soils near open woodlands or the forest edge and are found right here in the eastern part of Minnesota. It is a medium sized snake that often startles people the first time they see one, but it is not dangerous and will not bite. Unfortunately, many of these harmless snakes are killed by people who believe they are poisonous.

Hognose snakes eat frogs, small mammals, birds, bird eggs (killdeer beware), insects, lizards, other smaller snakes, reptile eggs and bugs. They have many predators to fend off, including hawks and owls, fox and opossum as well as other mammals - including man. In addition to predators, hognose snake numbers decline in areas where there is highway and housing development.

The eastern hognose snake mates in the spring. Females deposit 15 to 25 eggs in a depression under rocks or logs or in sandy soil. Eggs deposited in June or July will hatch in August and September.

Look for these friendly fellows at Anderson Park, you might be lucky enough to see one!

Twin Lakes Scientific and Natural Area planned for land adjacent to the park


Exciting news! The Isanti County Board approved a Minnesota Department of Natural Resources request for the acquisition of 48 acres to create Isanti County's first scientific and natural area (SNA) right here in Oxford Township. It is located on land adjacent to Anderson Park and across Horseshoe Lake. According to the DNR, the plan will protect and preserve this natural area. It will remain undeveloped, but open to the public for bird watching and hiking.

Perfect conditions for the second annual bird walk
